If your loved one is homeless or at risk of homelessness due to a serious medical condition, moving to a medical foster home may be an option.

Eligibility: Currently, 45 U.S. states and territories have medical foster homes approved by VA Medical Centers. Once you're enrolled in HBPC, you must wait for your desired medical foster home to have an opening. If you qualify for medical foster care, you'll need to pay for it with insurance or your own funds.

You may qualify for VA benefits that can help defray the cost of medical foster care. To find out if you're eligible for these benefits, make an appointment with a VA case manager or social worker.

Start by enrolling in Home Based Primary Care by filling out an application for Extended Care Benefits (VA Form 10-10EC). If you need help, contact your VA social worker or case manager.
